

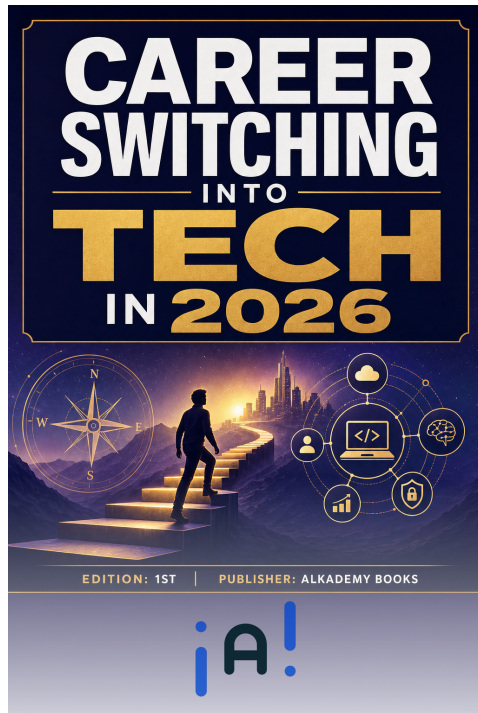

PREFACE

When I was thirty-one years old, I walked out of a hospital after a twelve-hour shift as a respiratory therapist, sat in my car in the parking garage, and opened my laptop to finish a Python tutorial I had started the night before. I wasn't sure what I was building toward exactly — I just knew that something in me had shifted, that the ceiling I could feel above my current career was real, and that the world of software and data and technology felt, for the first time, genuinely within reach. Two years later, I was working as a data analyst at a health-tech startup. That transition was not clean or linear. It was full of wrong turns, wasted money on courses I never finished, and moments of profound self-doubt. This book is the one I wish had existed when I was sitting in that parking garage.

This is a book for people who are already something — a teacher, a nurse, a marketing manager, a journalist, an accountant, a veteran, a stay-at-home parent returning to the workforce — and who are seriously considering becoming something else, something that involves technology. You do not need a computer science degree. You do not need to have written a single line of code. What you do need is curiosity, a willingness to be a beginner again, and the honesty to think clearly about what you actually want from this change. I have written with the assumption that you are intelligent, capable, and probably busier than you'd like to be. I have not written this book for people who are casually curious about tech. I've written it for people who are ready to make a real decision and take real steps.

The philosophy behind this book is simple: career switching is not primarily a skills problem. It is

a clarity problem. Most people who struggle to break into tech are not struggling because they haven't learned enough JavaScript or because their resume isn't formatted correctly. They're struggling because they haven't gotten honest with themselves about which part of tech actually fits them, what they're willing to sacrifice, and what timeline is realistic given their life. So before this book teaches you anything about specific roles or technical skills, it will slow you down and ask you harder questions. I believe that a well-aimed effort beats an exhausting one every time, and this book is designed to help you aim well before you run.

The book is organized into four parts. Part One is about orientation — understanding the current technology landscape as it exists in 2026, including which roles are growing, which are contracting in the face of AI automation, and what the industry actually looks like from the inside rather than from the outside. Part Two is about self-assessment and strategy, where I walk you through a framework for matching your existing background, skills, and personality to the roles most likely to suit you. A former teacher and a former financial analyst will take very different paths into tech, and this section helps you find yours rather than following someone else's. Part Three covers execution: how to build skills efficiently, how to construct a portfolio that demonstrates real competence, how to navigate job applications, technical interviews, and networking in an industry that can feel cliquish and opaque. Part Four deals with the transition itself — managing the psychological weight of starting over, handling financial pressure during a period of reduced income, and setting yourself up to grow once you've landed your first role. Each part builds on the last, but I've also written each section to stand on its own if you need to skip ahead.

By the time you finish this book, you will have a specific, named target role in the technology industry that genuinely fits your background and goals. You will have a realistic, step-by-step plan for reaching that role, including which skills to build, in what order, and through which resources. You will understand how hiring actually works in tech — not the idealized version, but the messy, human, relationship-driven reality of it. And you will have a clearer sense of who you are as a professional, which turns out to be the most durable asset you can carry into any new field.

I want to be transparent about what this book does not cover. It is not a coding tutorial. There are extraordinary resources for learning specific technical skills — many of them free — and I reference the best ones throughout, but reproducing them here would be redundant and would distract from what I believe this book does differently. I have also deliberately avoided writing a book that pretends every career switch into tech ends in a six-figure salary and a fully remote

dream job. Some do. Many result in something more modest and still deeply worthwhile. I have tried to be honest about the range of outcomes and the factors that influence them, because I think you deserve that honesty more than you deserve false encouragement.

One last thing before we begin. The technology industry in 2026 is not the same industry it was five years ago. Artificial intelligence has reshaped entire job categories, the remote work landscape has shifted again, and the skills that employers value most have changed in ways that matter enormously for career switchers. This book is written for this moment, not for a moment that has passed. The strategies here reflect where the industry actually is, not where it was when the last wave of "break into tech" content was written. You are entering at a complicated time, but also a genuinely exciting one. There is still a place for you here. Let's figure out exactly where that is.

To those who dare to teach themselves, and then teach others.
